She tried a number of building contractors; every single one turned her down: 'we don't employ women on jobs like that'; 'that's a man's job'; 'a building site is no place for a woman' – these were the common responses.

Mwanja Mwanja was determined not to be beaten. So she cut her hair short, dressed up in men's clothes, and even got herself an identity card under the name Rajab Maina. And it worked! She got a job for Notco Building Company. According to one of the foremen, she did 'extremely well' and looked 'exactly like a man'.

But one small slip and all was undone. 'Mr Maina' fell off some loose scaffolding and was rushed to the hospital. There a doctor demanded that 'he take off his' clothes for proper examination. 'Mr Maina' at first protested, but had to comply when the doctor threatened to make a report to her boss. So at last, the naked truth was out!

The company investigated the case through the Labour Office, and discovered the truth. Now that she is her former self again, Mwanja Mwanja is presenting the company with a problem, according to Mr Saidi, the company's personnel officer.

'We do not know what to do!' he said. 'We don't know whether to lose a good worker by handing her over to the police for giving false information; or to strike a blow for the Women's Movement and employ the first female scaffolder in this country'.

Asked why she had conned the firm, Miss Mwanja said: 'I couldn't find any other way of getting a job'.
